Writing from Harlem

- ① During the 1920s and 1930s, Harlem, a neighborhood in New York City, became a center of Black art and writing. This cultural flowering is called the Harlem Renaissance. Many Black Americans had moved north during the Great Migration, bringing stories, music, and hopes for new opportunities. Writers used poems, novels, essays, and plays to show daily life, celebrate Black culture, and challenge unfair treatment. Their work reached readers far beyond Harlem and shaped American literature.
- ② Poetry was especially important. Langston Hughes often drew on blues and jazz, music styles heard in Black communities. In poems such as “The Weary Blues,” his lines can sound musical, with repeated words, beats, and everyday speech. Other poets chose formal patterns, proving that Black writers could use many voices. Novelists such as Zora Neale Hurston included lively dialogue and regional dialect, or speech linked to a place. These choices helped characters sound distinct and made ordinary conversations part of literature.
- ③ Harlem Renaissance authors returned to several strong themes. They expressed pride in Black history and identity. They also examined racism, unequal chances, and the pressure to be seen fairly in American life. Some works showed city excitement, crowded streets, clubs, and music. Others explored family, work, migration, or dreams for the future. Although authors shared concerns, they did not all write alike. A quiet poem about loneliness and a humorous story told in dialect could both belong to the movement because each connected to Black life and culture.

3	What music styles influenced Langston Hughes's poetry, and what two features could make his lines sound musical?	Blues and jazz influenced his poetry. His lines could use repeated words, beats, and everyday speech.
