Fast Falcons, Credited Sources

- ① During a steep hunting dive, a peregrine falcon can reach speeds above 200 miles per hour. The Cornell Lab of Ornithology calls the bird “the fastest animal on Earth” (Cornell Lab of Ornithology). Its long, pointed wings help it move quickly through the air. Peregrines often hunt other birds, striking them after a fast dive called a stoop. Their speed makes this small raptor an exciting subject for a report about wildlife near cities, cliffs, and coastlines.
- ② In the United States, peregrine falcons nearly vanished from many places after the pesticide DDT harmed their ability to reproduce. When DDT was restricted and people protected nesting sites, the birds recovered in many areas (National Park Service). This recovery did not happen overnight. Scientists, park workers, and volunteers monitored nests and reduced dangers near nesting places. A writer could use this information in a report about how laws and conservation efforts can help an animal population return.
- ③ Works Cited Cornell Lab of Ornithology. “Peregrine Falcon Overview.” All About Birds, www.allaboutbirds.org/guide/Peregrine_Falcon/overview. National Park Service. “Peregrine Falcon.” National Park Service, www.nps.gov/subjects/animals/peregrine-falcon.htm. These entries include organization, source title, website name, and URL. The organization names match the names in parentheses in the report. A reader can use the entries to locate the original information and learn more about peregrine falcons. Writers place all sources they used on the works cited page in a research report, including sources they paraphrased and sources they quoted.
