Lanterns on the River

- ① When the sun slipped behind the hills, Mara carried her paper lantern to the riverbank beside the old stone bridge. Its blue sides glowed like a small, trapped moon. Around her, families unfolded blankets, and children chased the warm smell of grilled corn from a vendor's cart. The river waited, dark and smooth. Then the first lantern touched the water. It bobbed once, caught the current, and drifted away. One light became two. Two lights became a shining trail.
- ② Mara knelt at the edge and lowered her lantern. Cold water brushed her fingertips. For a breath, the lantern spun in a tiny circle, as if it could not choose a path. A breeze snapped the flags along the bridge. Mara released the string. The lantern skimmed past reeds, winked beneath the bridge, and joined the growing stream of color. Red, gold, green, and blue trembled on the ripples. The river carried every wish forward toward the wide bay.
- ③ Soon, hundreds of lanterns floated beyond the bridge. From the hill, they looked like stars that had fallen gently onto the river. Mara watched hers become one bright dot among many. She could no longer see its blue paper or the small crease near its top. Still, she knew it was moving. The river carried every wish forward. As the lanterns traveled, their light painted the water with trembling paths, and the dark river no longer seemed empty to anyone standing quietly along its bank.
