A Better Way to Refill

- ① Our school should install water refill stations in the hallway near the gym and cafeteria. Students often carry reusable bottles, but many must wait in line at a single fountain or buy bottled drinks. Refill stations connect to a building's water supply and usually include a spout that fills bottles quickly. Adding two stations would make it easier for students to choose water during busy parts of the day. This practical change could also reduce the number of single-use plastic bottles brought to school.
- ② Some people may argue that refill stations cost too much to install and maintain. That concern deserves attention, because the school must use its money carefully. However, the school can compare prices, seek a local grant, or install one station first. The need is clear: a quick count after lunch found twelve students waiting with bottles at one fountain. A station near the cafeteria could shorten that line and give students more time to eat, talk, or get to class.
- ③ Refill stations will not solve every health or waste problem at school. Students will still make their own choices about drinks, and custodians will need to keep the stations clean. Even so, convenient access to water removes one barrier to using reusable bottles. The school should begin by planning for two stations, checking costs, and asking students where they would be most useful. With a careful plan, the school can improve daily routines while responding responsibly to concerns about cost and upkeep.

Our school should add a shaded seating area near the playground. At lunch, students who want to sit outside often have only sunny tables. Shade can make an outdoor space more comfortable on hot, bright days. Some people may say the project would cost too much, but the school could begin with one canopy and compare prices. For these reasons, the school should plan a shaded area that students can use during lunch.
