Tide Pool Poem

- ① At low tide, the beach opens a hidden room. Black rocks shine like wet seals, and small pools hold pieces of sky. A crab sidesteps beneath a curtain of green seaweed. The waves whisper from beyond the sandbar, calling, "Come back, come back." I kneel near a pool and watch an anemone fold its soft arms around the water. Salt air stings my nose, while gulls cry above the bright, broken shells at my feet.
- ② Inside the largest pool, purple sea stars cling to stone with hundreds of tiny tube feet. A hermit crab drags a borrowed shell across the bottom, scratch, scrape, scratch. The tide pool keeps its secrets under a glassy lid, but sunlight slips through. Blue mussels cluster close together, dark as midnight buttons. I listen to the scratch, scrape, scratch, and the water answers with a soft splash. In this small world, every creature seems busy, busy, busy.
- ③ Then the ocean begins to return. First, a thin ribbon of water curls between the rocks. Then another ribbon follows, silver and quick. The waves tap the shore, tap the shore, tap the shore, until the pools tremble. "Time to go," the waves seem to say. I step back as foam races over the sand like a line of white lace. The hidden room closes, yet its watery voices follow me up the beach at sunset.

1	What two things are compared in the simile "Black rocks shine like wet seals"? What picture does this comparison create?	The rocks are compared to wet seals. The comparison makes the rocks seem dark, shiny, and rounded.
2	What object is personified in the sentence "The tide pool keeps its secrets under a glassy lid"? Which human action is it given?	The tide pool is personified. It is given the human action of keeping secrets.
3	How does the repeated phrase "scratch, scrape, scratch" help you imagine the hermit crab's movement?	It makes the crab's slow, rough movement sound rhythmic and easy to hear.
4	Copy one visual image and one sound image from the poem.	Possible visual image: "bright, broken shells." Possible sound image: "gulls cry."
