COLON WORKS

The colon comes after a complete thought. It introduces a list, an example, or an explanation.

The gardener needed four tools: a spade, shears, gloves, and a hose.

COLON DOES NOT WORK

The colon interrupts the sentence instead of introducing something after a complete thought.

The gardener needed: a spade, shears, gloves, and a hose.

8	The sky changed quickly: dark clouds covered the sun.	CORRECT	The complete thought before the colon is followed by an explanation of how the sky changed.

PART 3 • MAKE YOUR OWN (SAMPLE ANSWERS)

- **CORRECT:** The aquarium has one rule: keep hands away from the tanks.
- **INCORRECT:** The aquarium has: a rule about keeping hands away from the tanks.

Challenge: Lena stopped at the gate for one reason: the sign said the park was closed. She turned around and walked home.

Answers: 1 CORRECT, 2 CORRECT, 3 INCORRECT, 4 INCORRECT, 5 CORRECT, 6 INCORRECT, 7 CORRECT, 8 CORRECT. In Part 2, students should explain whether the words before the colon are a complete thought and whether the colon introduces a list, example, or explanation.
