Why Water Glows

- ① On a summer night, visitors to a mangrove lagoon in Puerto Rico may see the water flash blue when a paddle moves through it. The glow comes from tiny organisms called dinoflagellates. These one-celled plankton produce light through a chemical reaction. During the day, the organisms are nearly invisible, but after dark their brief flashes can make each ripple look as if it holds sparks. The display is most noticeable in sheltered water, where waves do not scatter the light.
- ② Scientists call this natural glow bioluminescence. The prefix bio- means “life,” and luminescence refers to giving off light. Together, the word describes light made by living things. Dinoflagellates are not trying to decorate the lagoon. Many species flash when they are disturbed, perhaps because the sudden brightness startles small animals that might eat them. This defensive response can also attract larger predators, which may chase away the original threat. In this way, a tiny flash may help a tiny organism survive.
- ③ Because these lagoons are delicate ecosystems, protecting them requires careful choices. Bright shoreline lights can make the organisms' glow harder for people to see, while pollution can harm the water itself. Park guides may ask visitors to use quiet paddles and avoid swimming in certain areas. These restrictions are not meant to spoil a trip. Instead, they help preserve a habitat where living things depend on clean, calm water. Local rules can reduce damage during busy tourist seasons.
