Maya's Park Message

- ① When Maya wrote a message to the parks department, she first planned to demand a new drinking fountain. Then she checked a learner's dictionary. Demand meant to ask forcefully, often as if the speaker expects obedience. Because Maya wanted to sound respectful, she changed demand to request. A request still asks for action, but it gives the reader room to consider the idea. Her word choice matched her purpose: inviting the department to work with students rather than ordering it to act.
- ② Next, Maya described the cracked pavement near the basketball court. A thesaurus offered damaged, worn, and broken as related words, so she compared their dictionary entries. Broken suggested that something no longer worked. Damaged could describe harm of many kinds. Worn fit best because years of feet, wheels, rain, and sun had gradually rubbed away the surface. Choosing worn helped Maya be precise without making the path sound completely unusable. She also added a photo, since the image showed the condition more clearly than a stronger word could.
- ③ In her final sentence, Maya wrote, “Please consider repairing the path this spring.” She did not write rebuilding because rebuilding usually means constructing something again after major loss or removal. Repairing meant fixing the existing path, which was what she wanted. Before sending the message, Maya asked the school librarian which source would best confirm each meaning. The librarian suggested a dictionary for definitions and a thesaurus for possible alternatives. Maya used both resources, then reread her message to make sure its tone was calm, accurate, and convincing.

3	What difference between repairing and rebuilding helped Maya choose repairing?	Repairing means fixing the existing path. Rebuilding usually means constructing something again after major loss or removal.
4	What did Maya use a dictionary to find, and what did she use a thesaurus to find?	She used a dictionary for definitions and a thesaurus for possible alternatives.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Please install a covered bike rack beside the library entrance. Many students leave bicycles in the rain, and a rack with a roof would protect seats and books in baskets.
