From Tray to Garden

- ① At noon, the cafeteria bins fill with apple cores, banana peels, and lettuce leaves. Starting Monday, Greenview Middle School will collect these food scraps for compost. Compost is a crumbly material made when natural waste breaks down. It can help the gardens behind the science wing hold water and nourish plants. Instead of sending every peel to a landfill, our school can turn part of its lunch waste into soil for the garden beds next spring.
- ② Students, your choices at the sorting station matter. Look for the green bin with a picture of a leaf. Drop fruit and vegetable scraps inside, but keep wrappers, straws, and sauce packets out. A volunteer will stand nearby during the first week to answer questions. If you are unsure about an item, ask before tossing it. One careful choice takes seconds, yet it keeps plastic from mixing with the compost that gardeners will use later.
- ③ Why should a small lunch habit matter? Each bin of clean scraps shows that students can solve a local problem together. The environmental club will post weekly totals in the hallway, so everyone can see how much material stays out of the trash. Bring your questions, ideas, and sharp eyes to the cafeteria on Monday. Let us make the garden's next batch of soil begin with today's lunch. Choose the green bin and help keep the project clean.

1	Who is the main audience for this announcement? Give one phrase from the text that shows this.	The audience is Greenvview Middle School students, especially students in the cafeteria. Evidence includes “Students, your choices” or “Bring your questions, ideas, and sharp eyes to the cafeteria.”
2	How does the list of items to put in and keep out of the green bin support the announcement's purpose?	The specific list gives students clear sorting directions, helping keep plastic and other trash out of the compost.
3	What effect does the question, “Why should a small lunch habit matter?” have on the tone and audience?	It creates an inviting, thoughtful tone and encourages students to consider how their own actions can help.
4	Why does the announcement say that weekly totals will be posted in the hallway?	Posting totals lets students see the group's progress and can motivate them to keep participating.
