Peregrines Above the City

- ① When I first saw a peregrine falcon above the courthouse, I wondered why a bird known for mountain cliffs was hunting in downtown streets. Today, I will explain why peregrines live in many cities and how people can help them. Peregrines are powerful raptors, or birds that hunt other animals. They often nest on tall ledges, so bridges and skyscrapers can provide places that resemble cliffs. This talk focuses on the falcons that share our city, not on every kind of bird of prey.
- ② City life also offers food. Pigeons and other medium-sized birds gather near buildings, and peregrines can hunt them in open air. A peregrine may dive at more than 200 miles per hour, making it one of the fastest animals on Earth. However, a fast hunter still needs a safe nest. During spring, adult falcons may guard eggs or young chicks on a ledge. People who stay back from a nest help the adults spend less energy responding to disturbance.
- ③ To protect these neighbors, our class can share accurate information instead of approaching a nest for a closer look. First, we can post a map that shows viewing areas from a respectful distance. Next, we can remind visitors to keep dogs and drones away from nesting sites. Finally, we can report an injured bird to a local wildlife rehabilitator, rather than trying to handle it ourselves. Clear actions like these let people enjoy city wildlife while giving peregrine families the space they need.

Today, I will explain how our school can waste less food at lunch. I am focusing on unopened items and fruit, not every kind of cafeteria trash. Less waste can save resources and give usable food another purpose. Food scraps can be composted, where they break down into material that enriches soil. Unopened packaged items may be collected for a food pantry if local rules allow safe donation. These choices keep edible items separate from trash. First, students can take only foods they expect to eat. Next, the cafeteria can place labeled bins for compost and unopened items. Finally, student volunteers can explain the bins during lunch. A simple system makes each choice clear.
