Pond Care Evening

- ① Last spring, Maya Chen paused beside Willow Pond after school and noticed a green frog resting near a plastic bottle. She and her science club counted litter along the shore, then wondered how they could protect this small habitat. Frogs need clean water and safe places to hide, and pond plants help hold soil in place. On Thursday, October 8, Ridgeview Middle School will host a Pond Care Evening for students and families. The event begins at 5:30 p.m. near the east gate.
- ② At the event, volunteers will give each family a map of the pond and a bag for collecting trash. Adults will supervise each work area. A short demonstration will show how to sort recyclables from items that belong in the landfill. The science club will also display photos from its spring litter count, so visitors can compare the shore before and after cleanup. The cleanup will end at 7 p.m. Bring a reusable water bottle. Wear closed-toe shoes because the bank can be muddy.
- ③ Your help can make the pond safer for wildlife and more welcoming for neighbors. Choose a task, such as handing out bags, recording the kinds of litter collected, or planting native sedges along the path. Add your name to the volunteer list by Tuesday, October 6. If you cannot attend, send clean, unused gardening gloves to Room 214. Share this announcement with an adult at home, and ask whether your family can join the cleanup that evening.

2	Name two planning details that help families decide whether they can attend. Explain why these details fit this audience.	The event begins at 5:30 p.m. near the east gate, and it ends at 7 p.m. Families need the time and location to plan transportation and schedules.
3	Why does the writer include facts about frogs, pond plants, recycling, and litter?	The facts explain why the cleanup matters and help visitors understand what they will do at the event.
4	How do the direct requests, such as bringing a water bottle or signing up, support the purpose of this announcement?	They give readers specific ways to participate in the pond cleanup.
