Lena Knows Her Choices

- ① On Tuesday, Lena chose a historical fiction novel about a girl who carried messages during the American Revolution. She likes novels that mix true events with an invented main character because she can imagine being inside the time period. Lena especially notices sensory details, such as the smell of wet wool or the sound of horses on a road. Those details help her remember what she reads. She usually reads this kind of book on paper, where she can place sticky notes beside scenes that surprise her.
- ② Writing works differently for Lena. When a class asks for an argument, she prefers a short editorial over a long report. In an editorial, she can state a clear claim, choose two strong reasons, and use one carefully explained example. Her favorite topic is protecting local parks because she has seen litter near the playground. Before drafting, she makes a quick list of evidence. Then she reads each paragraph aloud to check whether her ideas sound connected and convincing.
- ③ Still, Lena does not choose the same mode every time. On busy evenings, she listens to an audiobook of a mystery while packing her lunch. The narrator's changing voice helps her follow the clues, but she would not use audio for a difficult science article. For that, she wants to pause, reread headings, and draw arrows between ideas. Lena has learned that her preferences depend on her purpose. A fast mystery is for enjoyment, while a print article helps her study.
