### A Useful Morning

- ① On Saturday, I volunteered at the Riverbend Library's repair café, where neighbors brought broken lamps, radios, and toys. I expected to sort screws, but Mr. Alvarez handed me a silent blue alarm clock. Its plastic case was scratched, and the minute hand hung loose. When I opened the back, a tiny spring rolled across the table. My stomach tightened as it disappeared beneath a box of donated books. I froze, afraid I had ruined the clock completely.
- ② Mr. Alvarez did not rush to fix it for me. He pointed to a flashlight on the shelf and said, “Try looking from the floor.” I knelt, sweeping the beam under the table. The light caught a silver curl beside a backpack strap. I laughed so loudly that two people looked over. After I returned the spring, we fitted it into place with tweezers. The clock clicked once, then began ticking in a steady, cheerful rhythm.
- ③ Before leaving, I set the repaired clock on the library's checkout desk. Its hands showed 3:17, although it was nearly noon, and that mistake made everyone smile. Mr. Alvarez asked whether I wanted to take the clock home. I shook my head. “Someone else might need it,” I said. As I walked outside, rain tapped the library windows, but I barely noticed. I kept hearing the clock's small tick, a sound that made the morning feel useful.
