A Reader Changes Course

- ① Before reading an article about the 1918 influenza pandemic, Mateo chose a purpose: he wanted to learn how communities tried to slow the spread of illness. He set a goal to identify three actions people took and one reason each action mattered. At the top of his page, he wrote these targets. This plan kept him from collecting every interesting fact. Instead, he paused after each section and asked whether the details helped answer his purpose.
- ② In one section, Mateo read that some cities closed schools, theaters, and other crowded places. He understood why fewer gatherings could reduce contact among people. Then he reached a sentence about “nonpharmaceutical interventions.” The term slowed him down because he was not sure what it included. Rather than guessing, he reread the surrounding sentences. He used the examples of closures and limits on gatherings to infer that the term meant actions that did not involve medicine. He wrote a brief note beside the sentence.
- ③ Later, Mateo found a chart comparing death rates in several cities. His first goal, finding three actions, did not help him make sense of the numbers. He adjusted his goal. Now he looked for one pattern connecting a city's actions to its death rate, and he checked the chart title and labels before drawing a conclusion. He noticed that the chart showed differences, not proof that one action alone caused an outcome. By changing his goal, Mateo could read the chart carefully without making a claim the evidence could not support.
