A Backup for the World's Seeds

- ① High above the Arctic Circle, the Svalbard Global Seed Vault is carved into a mountain on the Norwegian island of Spitsbergen. It stores backup copies of crop seeds from seed banks around the world. The vault does not replace local seed banks, which grow, test, and share seeds with farmers. Instead, it protects samples if a collection is damaged by war, disaster, or equipment failure. Its cold location and thick rock help keep seeds frozen for many years.
- ② In 2015, the International Center for Agricultural Research in the Dry Areas, often called ICARDA, withdrew seed samples from the vault. Fighting in Syria had made its usual seed bank difficult to use. ICARDA planted the withdrawn seeds at temporary sites in Lebanon and Morocco. Workers grew crops, collected fresh seeds, and rebuilt the collection. In 2017, ICARDA began sending new backup samples to Svalbard. This process showed why a backup collection matters when a research center cannot safely use its original site.
- ③ Each seed packet at Svalbard is sealed and labeled so scientists can identify the crop and where it came from. The vault holds many kinds of food crops, including grains, beans, and vegetables. Keeping different varieties is important because farmers may need plants that can handle drought, disease, or changing temperatures. A seed sample is not useful only as a stored object. It can help researchers and farmers restore a crop collection or test varieties that may meet future challenges.
