Why Some City Blocks Feel Hotter

- ① On a sunny afternoon, Maya noticed that the blacktop near her bus stop felt hotter than the grass in a nearby park. Her science club investigated this difference. They learned about an urban heat island, an area of a city that stays warmer than nearby rural land. Dark roofs, roads, and parking lots absorb sunlight and release heat slowly. Trees and soil, in contrast, provide shade and cool the air as water evaporates from leaves. The group wondered how heat affected people waiting outside.
- ② To gather evidence, the club used thermometers at noon and again after sunset. Their data showed that paved places remained warm longer. The students proposed a mitigation plan, a plan meant to lessen a harmful problem. They suggested planting shade trees, painting some roofs lighter colors, and adding gardens beside sidewalks. These changes would not eliminate hot days, but they could reduce the temperature around buildings. The principal asked the club to explain which ideas were practical, meaning possible to carry out with the school's time, space, and money.
- ③ Later, Maya read that some neighborhoods have a microclimate, the weather conditions in one small area. The prefix micro- means small, so the word points to a small area's climate. A tree-lined block may be cooler than an open block only a few streets away. This local difference can influence health. During extreme heat, people who cannot easily reach air-conditioned spaces face a greater risk of heat illness. By comparing temperatures and listening to residents, city planners can prioritize places where cooling projects are most needed.
