More Than Soil

- ① When our school announced plans to replace the unused east lawn with a community garden, some students pictured extra chores. I pictured tomatoes, pollinators, and a place where science lessons could leave the classroom. As a seventh grader who eats lunch near that patch of grass, I have watched it collect litter and puddles. The garden proposal will not solve every campus problem, but it could turn a forgotten corner into a shared resource for everyone.
- ② This column appears in the student newspaper one week before the school board votes on the project. My readers are classmates who may use the garden, so they deserve details, not slogans. The plan would use a portion of the lawn, include raised beds, and rely on volunteers from the environmental club and a nearby food bank. It would also cost money for soil, tools, and water access. Those limits matter, and supporters should explain how they will meet them.
- ③ Still, I favor moving ahead. A garden can give students a reason to care for a space they pass each day, and it can provide herbs or vegetables for the cafeteria if the harvest succeeds. Before the vote, the board should ask for a schedule, a budget, and adult supervision. Asking these questions is not opposition. It is the best way to make a useful idea last beyond its exciting first week for future students.

4	State the author's point of view about the garden. Then name two details that show the author is considering the audience and context.	The author supports the garden but wants a practical plan. The author mentions costs for supplies and water, and asks for a schedule, budget, and adult supervision before the board vote.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Classmates, the principal will decide next Friday whether to open the library thirty minutes before school. As a student who waits outside in cold weather, I support the change. Early access would give bus riders a quiet place to read, finish homework, or use computers. The library would need an adult supervisor, so the plan should include a staff schedule. This small change would help students start the day prepared instead of standing in the hallway.
