New to Robotics? Start Here

- ① Are you curious about robots but unsure where to begin? Riverview Middle School's Robotics Club welcomes students who have never built or coded anything. Meet us in Room 214 on Tuesdays from 3:20 to 4:30, beginning September 10. You do not need to bring tools or buy a kit. The school provides shared materials, and team leaders will show you the first steps. Come once to watch with a friend, or join a team that day.
- ② **YOUR FIRST MEETING:** 1. Check in at the door when you arrive and choose a name tag. 2. Sit with the beginner table, where a leader will give your group a small challenge, such as making a sensor light up. 3. Share what happened, even if your design did not work yet. The club uses short directions and picture cards during challenges, so you can focus on trying ideas instead of memorizing technical words. Ask a leader whenever you need help.
- ③ Robotics Club is a place to test, change, and test again. A robot that bumps into a wall is not a failure. It is a clue. Your team can adjust one part, run the program again, and notice what changes. By the end of each meeting, groups post a quick photo or drawing of one idea they tried. Small steps can lead to surprising solutions, and every new builder has a first design to share.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	Who is the main audience for this announcement? Use two details from paragraph 1 to support your answer.	The audience is students who are new to robotics. The announcement says students may have never built or coded anything, and they do not need tools or a kit.
2	Which details does the author highlight to help a reader decide whether to attend the club? Explain why those details matter to the intended audience.	The author highlights the meeting room, day and time, start date, free shared materials, and the option to watch first. These details help inexperienced students plan and see that joining is possible.
3	How does the format of paragraph 2 make the announcement accessible for its intended readers?	The heading and numbered steps organize what will happen at a first meeting in order, helping new students follow the plan.
4	Why might the author use the short sentence, "It is a clue," after describing a robot bumping into a wall?	The sentence reframes a mistake as useful information. It makes beginners feel that an unsuccessful try can help them improve a design.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

FIND YOUR LOST ITEM Did you leave a jacket, water bottle, or lunch box behind? Visit the Lost and Found table by the main office before school or during lunch. First, look at the labeled bins.
