Orpheus Sings Again

- ① An ancient Greek myth tells of Orpheus, a gifted musician whose wife, Eurydice, dies after a snakebite. Grief drives him to the Underworld, where he sings so beautifully that Hades agrees to release her. Orpheus may lead Eurydice home only if he does not look back until they reach the world above. Near the exit, fear defeats him. He turns, and Eurydice disappears into the Underworld again. The myth uses a serious, tragic style to explore love, loss, and human doubt.
- ② Writer Anaïs Mitchell adapted this myth in *Hadestown*, a folk and jazz musical that first appeared as a concept album in 2010 and reached Broadway in 2019. Her version keeps the journey below, Hades, the rule against looking back, and Orpheus's final turn. Yet Mitchell changes important details. Her Eurydice goes to *Hadestown* because hunger and cold make Hades's offer tempting. This choice gives Eurydice more control over her path. Instead of sounding like an ancient legend, the musical uses songs, repeated lines, and lively dialogue to tell the story.
- ③ These changes shape the musical's themes. The old myth warns that even deep love cannot always overcome death or uncertainty. *Hadestown* also asks why people make painful choices when they lack food, warmth, or safety. Its repeated storytelling has another purpose: the narrator invites the audience to hear the tale again, even though the ending is known. That hopeful, questioning style contrasts with the myth's finality. By retelling a tragic myth in a modern musical form, Mitchell connects an old story about doubt to unfair conditions that still affect people.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

I would adapt the myth of Icarus as a graphic novel set at a drone-building contest. It would keep Daedalus's warning and Icarus's risky flight, but Icarus would crash a drone rather than die; bright panels and short captions would create a tense style while developing the theme that ambition needs judgment.
