Writing a New Renaissance

- ① In the 1920s, the Harlem Renaissance brought a burst of Black American writing, music, and art to Harlem in New York City. Many Black families had moved from the rural South to northern cities during the Great Migration. Writers explored what it meant to build a full life amid opportunity and racism. Their work often expressed racial pride, community, freedom, and the energy of city life. Magazines, theaters, and publishers gave artists places to share new voices with wide audiences.
- ② Poetry was especially visible in the movement. Langston Hughes used the rhythms and repeated lines of blues and jazz in poems such as “The Weary Blues.” His plain, musical language could sound like a performer speaking to a crowd. Claude McKay wrote sonnets, a tightly patterned poetry form, including “If We Must Die,” which speaks with a formal, urgent voice about resistance. Although both poets addressed Black experience, their poem forms and sounds created different effects.
- ③ Other writers chose fiction, essays, and drama. In the novel *Their Eyes Were Watching God*, Zora Neale Hurston used vivid description and Southern Black speech to portray Janie Crawford's search for independence. Essayists such as Alain Locke argued that Black artists should shape their own cultural image. Onstage, plays and musical revues drew on dance, song, and everyday conversation. Across these genres, writers mixed formal literary techniques with voices heard in Black communities, making the period's literature both artistic and rooted in lived experience.

During the Harlem Renaissance, a fictional blues poem titled "Roots on Lenox" explores community pride. Its repeated phrase, "Our drums wake every window," creates a musical, chant-like style. The poem's theme, genre, and voice fit a movement that celebrated Black culture.
