Falcons Above the City

- ① On a spring morning, I watched a peregrine falcon circle above the river near downtown. The bird folded its wings and dropped quickly toward a pigeon. Peregrine falcons are known for fast dives, called stoops, and they often nest on tall buildings or cliffs (Cornell Lab of Ornithology). My notes describe what I saw that morning. The research fact comes from Cornell's bird guide, so its source appears in parentheses after the idea in my report.
- ② Historical research explains why people now protect these birds. In the mid-1900s, the pesticide DDT caused many peregrine falcons to produce eggs with thin shells, and populations fell sharply (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service). After DDT was banned in the United States in 1972, captive-breeding and release programs helped peregrines recover (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service). The same source names both the problem and the recovery. I place its organization name in parentheses because those facts came from that agency's report.
- ③ At the end of my report, I add a Works Cited page with a full entry for each source. A parenthetical citation points to an entry that begins with the same author or organization name. My page has these entries: Cornell Lab of Ornithology. "Peregrine Falcon." All About Birds, https://www.allaboutbirds.org/guide/Peregrine_Falcon. Accessed 17 Aug. 2026. U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. "Peregrine Falcon (Falco peregrinus)." U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, <https://www.fws.gov/species/peregrine-falcon-falco-peregrinus>. Accessed 17 Aug. 2026. The entries provide titles, websites, web addresses, and access dates, details that do not fit inside the parentheses.
