Creek Cleanup Invitation

- ① Saturday morning, the creek behind Maple Park will trade its coat of wrappers and bottles for clear, moving water. Our seventh-grade service team is planning a cleanup from 9:00 to 11:00. Bring gloves, a refillable water bottle, and shoes that can handle mud. We will sort trash, record what we find, and place reusable items in recycling bins. Families are welcome, but students may attend with a signed permission slip at the check-in table near the pavilion.
- ② Last spring, rain carried loose litter toward the storm drain, where it could travel into the creek. A snack bag caught on a branch can become a bright warning flag, and a line of bottle caps can look like a trail leading nowhere good. By removing debris before the next storm, volunteers can help protect water, birds, and the paths people use. The work is small in each pair of hands, yet it can change the whole shoreline.
- ③ Meet us by the picnic shelter at 8:45 to sign in and choose a section of the bank. The creek has carried our neighborhood's reflections for years, and now it needs more than worried looks from the bridge. Bring a friend who notices details, whether that is a hidden can tab or a heron's careful footprints. Let us give the water a cleaner path and leave the park ready for its next visitors that afternoon.

1	What picture does the phrase "trade its coat of wrappers and bottles" create? How does that picture support the invitation's purpose?	It pictures litter covering the creek like a coat. This makes the pollution seem noticeable and supports the call to remove it.
2	How does calling a caught snack bag a "bright warning flag" affect the tone of paragraph 2?	It creates a cautionary tone by making the litter seem like a clear sign of a problem.
3	What idea does the contrast between "small in each pair of hands" and "the whole shoreline" communicate to possible volunteers?	It suggests that each person's small effort can combine with others' efforts to make a larger difference.
4	How does the phrase "needs more than worried looks from the bridge" appeal to the audience?	It pushes readers to act instead of only feeling concerned, making them feel responsible for helping.
