### A Later Bell for Riverview

- ① Riverview Middle School should begin classes at 8:30 a.m. instead of 7:45 a.m. Many students arrive before they are fully awake, especially when buses pick them up early. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that middle and high schools start at 8:30 a.m. or later because teens need enough sleep for health, safety, and learning. A later bell would give students more time to sleep, eat breakfast, and arrive ready to focus. This change would support learning from the first class of the day.
- ② Some families may worry that a later start would make after-school sports, jobs, or child care harder to schedule. That concern deserves planning, because buses and activities affect many people. However, schools can move some practice times, coordinate bus routes, and share schedules with families before the change begins. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that insufficient sleep is common among high school students, and early start times can make it harder for adolescents to get enough sleep. A schedule problem can be solved, but students cannot learn well when they are exhausted.
- ③ Therefore, the school board should approve a one-year 8:30 a.m. start-time trial for Riverview Middle School. During the trial, the school can compare attendance, tardiness, and student surveys with this year's results. Families should receive bus and activity information several months ahead, so they can plan for new routines. If the trial shows that students arrive more rested and ready to learn, the board should keep the later schedule. This careful plan addresses the scheduling concern while putting student learning and health first.

**PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)**

Our school should offer a quiet lunch area for students who need a calmer place to eat. A quieter space can help students who feel overwhelmed by noise, and it gives students a place to finish eating without rushing. Some people may say that supervising another area would be difficult. However, the school could use an existing library corner and assign a rotating staff member. Therefore, the principal should test a quiet lunch area for one month and ask students whether it helps.
