Three Messages, One Event

- ① Ever wondered what lives under a garden rock? Come to the Garden Workday on Saturday, May 10, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. behind the gym. You can hunt for wiggly worms, scoop soft soil, and plant tomatoes that may grow into pizza sauce. Wear clothes that can get muddy, bring a water bottle, and find the green flag near the gate. Bring an adult with you, then get ready to dig, discover, and help our garden glow.
- ② Families are invited to the Garden Workday on Saturday, May 10, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. behind the gym. Adults should stay with younger children throughout the event. The school will provide gloves, hand tools, and planting materials. Please send water, sunscreen, and a hat, since much of the work will happen outdoors. Reply by Thursday so the Garden Team can prepare enough supplies. Use the east parking lot and sign in at the table by the gate before entering the garden.
- ③ Principal Chen, the Garden Team requests permission to hold a family workday on May 10, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m., behind the gym. The event will maintain the garden while giving students a chance to practice responsibility and teamwork. Adult volunteers will supervise tool use, and the team will inspect the area before and after the event. We will use the east parking lot to keep the bus lane clear. May we reserve the space and post the attached family notice?

1	Name the intended audience for each paragraph. Cite one phrase from each paragraph that helps you identify that audience.	Paragraph 1 targets children, shown by phrases such as "wiggly worms" and "Bring an adult." Paragraph 2 targets families, shown by "Adults should stay with younger children." Paragraph 3 targets Principal Chen, shown by the direct greeting and request for permission.
2	How do the word choices in paragraph 1 make the event appealing to its audience? Use two examples from the paragraph.	Playful, sensory words make gardening sound like an adventure for children. Examples include "wiggly worms," "soft soil," and "garden glow."
3	What practical details does paragraph 2 include that paragraph 1 does not? Explain why families would need those details.	Paragraph 2 includes supervision, supplied materials, sunscreen, a reply deadline, parking, and sign-in directions. Families need planning and safety information before attending.
4	Which two details in paragraph 3 would likely help persuade the principal to approve the event? Explain how those details address the principal's concerns.	The safety plan for supervising tools and inspecting the area, plus the plan to keep the bus lane clear, address concerns about student safety and school operations.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Families, drop in to the Student Art Walk on Thursday, October 16, from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m. in the cafeteria.
