Lights Out, Stars On

- ① Lights Out, Stars On: Family Sky Watch, Friday, October 18, 7:30 to 9:00 p.m., at Riverside Field. Bring a blanket, a water bottle, and a flashlight covered with red cellophane. The field will be dark so that our eyes can adjust to the night sky. Astronomers from the local science center will point out planets, constellations, and the Moon. Children and adults are welcome, and no telescope is needed. A volunteer will guide visitors from the parking lot to the field. Use the marked path and arrive before sunset.
- ② Why wait for a screen to show you the universe? Step outside and look up. In a darker place, you may notice the Milky Way as a pale band of distant stars that city lights often hide. This event asks families to switch off outdoor lights for one evening and see what changes. Your small choice can make the sky feel larger, quieter, and full of questions. Come ready to observe, sketch, and share one discovery.
- ③ Before you leave home, check the weather and wear shoes that can handle damp grass. If rain is expected, visit the school website by 5:00 p.m. for an update. Adults should stay with younger children. Please do not shine white flashlights toward the observing area, because bright light can interrupt other visitors' night vision. 1	Identify one schedule or location detail and one materials detail from paragraph 1. How does each detail help a family prepare?	The time and Riverside Field tell families when and where to go. The blanket, water bottle, and red-covered flashlight tell them what to bring.
2	How does the opening question in paragraph 2 affect the flyer's tone and audience?	It creates a curious, conversational tone and directly invites readers, especially families, to imagine looking at the real night sky.
3	What tone do the words "larger, quieter, and full of questions" create? Explain how those words support the flyer's purpose.	They create a tone of wonder. They make the sky watch sound meaningful and appealing, which encourages families to attend.
4	Why does paragraph 3 include both a rule about white flashlights and a reason for that rule?	The rule gives visitors a clear safety and courtesy direction, and the reason explains that bright light can interrupt night vision.
