A Broken Water Main

- ① When a water main breaks, city workers may issue a boil-water notice. The notice is a public safety alert, so it puts the most urgent action first: boil tap water used for drinking, cooking, brushing teeth, or making ice. Next, it names the affected streets, the start time, and a phone number or website. Short headings and bullet points help residents find directions quickly. The alert does not begin with a long account of the broken pipe because people need instructions before background details.
- ② A local news report about the same break uses a different arrangement. Its lead states what happened, where it happened, and how service was affected. Later paragraphs add details from utility officials, explain the repair work, and describe when testing might allow the notice to end. A reporter may include a resident's comment, but the report separates that comment from verified facts. This structure helps readers understand the event and judge which information comes from sources. It is not organized as a list of commands, because its main purpose is to inform the public about an event.
- ③ An eighth-grade student might tell the story in a personal blog post. That genre could open with the moment her faucet sputtered, then move through her family's decisions during the notice. She could describe carrying a pot of water to the stove and wondering whether school would close. Near the end, she might reflect on how the event changed her view of clean water. Unlike the alert or news report, the blog post can focus on one person's experience and feelings. Its time order lets readers follow events as the writer lived them.

1	How does the safety alert's order of information differ from the news report's order? How does each order fit its purpose?	The alert gives the urgent action first, then location, time, and contact details so residents can act quickly. The news report leads with what happened, where, and the effect, then adds source-based details to inform readers.
2	Name two details placed after the urgent action in the safety alert. Why are they placed after the action?	The alert gives the affected streets, start time, and contact information after the action. These details come later because people need to know what to do first.
3	How does the news report arrange a resident's comment differently from verified facts? Why does this matter?	The report separates the resident's comment from verified facts. This helps readers judge which information comes from sources.
4	Why does time order fit the personal blog post better than it would fit the safety alert?	Time order lets readers follow the writer's experience and feelings as events happened. A safety alert needs to give urgent directions first instead.
