The 2003 Blackout

- ① On August 14, 2003, a power failure spread across parts of the northeastern United States and Ontario, Canada. During the late afternoon, transmission lines shut down suddenly in a chain reaction across the region. In New York City, traffic lights went dark, elevators stopped, and subway trains halted. The outage eventually affected about 50 million people. At first, many residents did not know whether the cause was an accident, a natural disaster, or something else.
- ② Investigators later found that the blackout did not begin with one dramatic explosion. In Ohio, several high-voltage lines touched overgrown trees and switched off. A computer system that should have warned operators also failed, so the trouble was not recognized quickly. As more lines disconnected, electricity rushed onto other lines, which then overloaded. This cascade cut power to a wide area. The event showed how closely linked electrical systems can be during a major emergency.
- ③ Without electricity, people used flashlights, walked up apartment stairs, and waited in long lines for buses. Some stores closed because registers and security systems could not operate. Hospitals relied on backup generators, while emergency workers directed traffic at busy intersections. Power returned at different times, and many places were restored by the next day. Afterward, utilities and government agencies studied the failure and strengthened procedures intended to prevent a similar failure from spreading across the region.
