A Statement on the Podium

- ① In October 1968, athletes from around the world arrived in Mexico City for the Summer Olympics. The city sits more than 7,000 feet above sea level, so its thin air affected races and training. That year, many nations had recently gained independence, and competition became a way to display national pride. Television carried Olympic images to huge audiences. At the same time, protests and violence connected to civil rights struggles were making headlines in the United States and other countries.
- ② On October 16, after the 200 meter medal ceremony, American sprinters Tommie Smith and John Carlos stood on the podium with Australian runner Peter Norman. Smith and Carlos each raised a black gloved fist during the U.S. anthem. They wore black socks without shoes to point to poverty. Norman wore an Olympic Project for Human Rights badge after learning about the protest. The athletes used this public, international event, where their actions could be seen worldwide, to draw attention to racial injustice in the United States and beyond.
- ③ Understanding the moment changes how a reader interprets a photograph of the podium. Without background information, the gestures might look like a private disagreement or a victory pose. Knowing about segregation, poverty, civil rights activism, and the worldwide audience shows that the athletes were making a planned public statement. Their action drew both support and criticism. Olympic officials removed Smith and Carlos from the Games, while the image later became a lasting symbol of protest in sports and public life for many people around the world afterward.

It was a public protest against racial injustice, witnessed by an international audience.
