### A Reporter's Purpose

- ① In the late 1880s, journalist Jacob Riis walked through crowded tenements on New York City's Lower East Side. Riis had immigrated from Denmark in 1870 and had experienced unemployment and hunger after arriving in the United States. As a police reporter, he saw families living in dark, poorly ventilated rooms. His experiences led him to view unsafe housing as a public problem, not simply a private failure. He wanted readers with money and political power to notice conditions they could usually avoid.
- ② In 1890, Riis published *How the Other Half Lives*, combining reporting with photographs and descriptions of tenement life. New flash photography allowed him to show indoor spaces that daylight photography could not capture. He selected scenes of overcrowding, poverty, and neglect because he hoped to persuade middle-class readers and city leaders to support housing reform. His book did not present every New Yorker's experience. Instead, its examples and urgent tone reflected his purpose of exposing conditions he believed were unjust.
- ③ Riis wrote during a period when rapid immigration and industrial growth had increased New York City's population. Many wealthy residents lived far from the tenements and knew little about them. These circumstances shaped both his audience and his method: he used startling images and direct language to bring distant conditions close. The book helped build support for reform, although change came through many people's efforts. In 1901, New York State passed the Tenement House Act, which required improvements such as better light, ventilation, and fire safety in many apartment buildings.
