Choosing Evidence for a Filling Station

- ① An eighth-grade team is investigating whether its school should install a water-bottle filling station. The decision will be made by the principal and the school board, so the team needs current information about cost, maintenance, student use, and water quality. First, students find a 2017 print newspaper article about a nearby school's new station. The article quotes that school's principal, who says students used it often. It gives no price or repair records. The article offers useful local history, but its age and missing details limit its value for a 2026 decision.
- ② Next, the team opens a digital webpage from a company that sells filling stations. A large counter and photos of students with reusable bottles make the page appealing to schools. The page claims that one station will keep 10,000 plastic bottles from landfills each year, but it does not explain how the company calculated that number. Because the company wants customers, its claim needs checking against an independent source. The webpage may help the team compare features, yet it is not strong evidence for savings or environmental impact.
- ③ Finally, students examine a 2025 multimodal infographic from the city water department. It combines short text, a map of public water-testing sites, and a chart showing that the department tests drinking water regularly. A link leads to the department's full testing reports, so readers can check the evidence. This source is current and credible for local water quality. Its map and clear icons could help students and board members understand the issue quickly. Still, the infographic cannot answer whether the school can afford installation or future repairs.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

The team should use a 2026 district facilities report that lists installation bids and repair costs for other schools. Because the district facilities office manages school buildings and provides dated records, the report could verify costs and maintenance needs that the board must consider.
