The Last Bell

- ① At 3:17, the final bell split the humid air, and Maya shoved her sketchbook into her backpack. Outside, rain tapped the pavement like impatient fingers. Most students rushed toward buses, but Maya stopped beside the vacant lot across from school. A blue heron stood there, pale and still among puddles and bent weeds. Its long beak pointed toward the water, as if the bird had been waiting for a message. Maya forgot the bell, the buses, and even the rain.
- ② She opened her sketchbook beneath the awning of a closed corner store. Instead of writing, "The bird was pretty," Maya drew quick lines and wrote, "Its silver feathers flashed against the bruised sky." The words made the heron seem sharp and important, not merely attractive. Then the bird lifted one thin leg from the mud. It moved with the care of a dancer crossing a stage covered in glass. Maya held her breath. Splash. The heron had caught a small fish, and the puddles shivered around its feet.
- ③ On the walk home, Maya noticed that the lot was not empty after all. Water gathered in tire tracks, and tiny beetles skimmed its surface. The heron stepped into the weeds, then vanished behind a chain-link fence. Maya wrote one final line: "Even forgotten places keep a secret pulse." She did not mean that the lot had a real heartbeat. She meant that life continued there, hidden from people hurrying past. By dinner, her page held more than a bird. It held a reason to look again.

3	What does the comparison to “a dancer crossing a stage covered in glass” suggest about the heron’s movement?	It suggests that the heron moves very carefully and delicately.
4	What does Maya mean by “Even forgotten places keep a secret pulse”? Use the next sentence to explain.	She means that life continues in overlooked places, even when people hurry past without noticing it.
