The Loose Panel

- ① Rain rattled the glass roof of the neighborhood greenhouse as I locked the potting shed. At first, the sound was steady, almost peaceful. Then the lights blinked once and vanished. In the dark, the watering system clicked off, leaving only the sharp smell of wet soil. "Mara?" called Mr. Chen from the far aisle. I lifted my phone, but its battery showed one red bar. Somewhere near the seed trays, metal scraped against metal.
- ② I moved toward his voice, stepping around overturned trays. My shoe sank into a puddle. Cold water soaked through my sock. I wanted to run outside, yet Mr. Chen had sounded frightened. "Stay where you are," I said, though my voice shook. A flash of lightning filled the greenhouse. For one second, I saw a loose ventilation panel swinging above him. It slammed shut. The scrape came again, closer this time. My breath caught in my throat.
- ③ "The panel!" I shouted. Mr. Chen ducked as wind shoved it open again. We crossed the aisle together, each step slower than the last because broken clay pots covered the floor. I grabbed the emergency crank beside the door and turned it. Once. Twice. The panel lowered with a groan, then locked. The rain still hammered the roof, but the scraping stopped. Mr. Chen exhaled. I laughed, surprised by the sound, and finally noticed that my hands were trembling.
