A Debate on Maple Avenue

- ① Riverton is considering a protected bike lane on Maple Avenue, a busy street that connects two middle schools, a library, and several stores. The proposal would replace one lane of car traffic with a lane separated from vehicles by low barriers. City planners collected traffic counts, crash reports, and survey responses before holding a public meeting. Two local writers studied the same public records. Each writer agrees that Maple Avenue needs changes, but they reach different conclusions about which change would best serve the community.
- ② In the Riverton Gazette, Lena Ortiz supports the protected lane. She emphasizes crash reports showing that 18 people riding bicycles were injured on Maple Avenue during the previous five years. Ortiz also cites a city traffic count showing that about 600 cyclists use the street on a typical weekday. She interprets these facts as evidence that riders need a safer, direct route. Although a survey found that some drivers worry about slower trips, Ortiz argues that barriers would make the street more predictable for everyone, including people walking across it.
- ③ Writing in the Maple Avenue Business Journal, Daniel Cho opposes the protected lane in its proposed form. He uses the same traffic count, but emphasizes that nearly 12,000 cars travel the avenue on a typical weekday. Cho focuses on survey comments from store owners who expect delivery vehicles to have fewer places to stop. He interprets the records as a warning that removing a car lane could create congestion and hurt nearby businesses. Instead, Cho recommends painted bike lanes on side streets and stricter speed enforcement on Maple Avenue.

2	What evidence does Ortiz emphasize that Cho does not emphasize, and how does it support her position?	Ortiz emphasizes that 18 bicyclists were injured during five years. She uses those crash reports to argue that riders need a protected, safer route.
3	What survey information does Cho emphasize, and what conclusion does he draw from it?	Cho emphasizes store owners' concerns that delivery vehicles would have fewer places to stop. He concludes that the proposed protected lane could hurt nearby businesses.
4	What different priorities shape the writers' conclusions? Use one detail from each writer.	Ortiz prioritizes safety for cyclists and walkers, using injury reports and cyclist counts. Cho prioritizes traffic flow and businesses, using car counts and store owners' delivery concerns.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Author A supports a protected lane on Harbor Road. She emphasizes the three bicycle crashes and argues that barriers could prevent more injuries. Author B opposes removing a car lane, pointing to the 2,000 daily cars and the 40 daily riders. He interprets those numbers as a reason to improve crossings instead of building a protected lane.

Accept equivalent explanations that accurately connect each writer's selected evidence to that writer's conclusion. For Part 3, accept varied positions if both authors use the given facts differently and explain different interpretations.
