## SUBJECT AND VERB AGREE

A singular subject takes a singular verb. A plural subject takes a plural verb.

The lantern glows beside the door.

## SUBJECT AND VERB DO NOT AGREE

The verb must match the subject, not a nearby noun. A singular subject and a plural verb, or a plural subject and a singular verb, create a mismatch.
