Protecting Sea Turtle Nests

- ① Each summer, sea turtle conservation teams patrol beaches after dark, looking for fresh tracks in the sand. A patrol may cover only a few miles, but its members work slowly because a nest can be easy to miss. When they find one, volunteers record its location, the species, and signs of danger, such as nearby lights or tire marks. This record helps biologists compare nesting activity from one season to the next. Teams avoid touching eggs unless flooding, erosion, or another serious threat makes moving a nest necessary.
- ② At some sites, workers place a screen over a nest to protect it from predators. The screen is not a shelter from heat, however, so teams choose materials that allow air and rain to pass through. If a high tide is likely to wash away the eggs, trained staff may shelter the clutch in a protected hatchery until conditions improve. They check temperature because warmer and cooler sand can influence the sex ratio of many sea turtle species. A daily record of these checks reveals whether the hatchery is working as intended.
- ③ After hatchlings emerge, teams usually wait until evening before they release them near the water. Darkness can reduce exposure to some daytime predators and helps prevent the hatchlings from overheating on open sand. The release must occur close enough to the shore for the young turtles to crawl across the beach, a movement scientists think helps them orient themselves. During one release, observers count hatchlings that reach the surf and note obstacles, including artificial lights. Those observations can guide local efforts to make nesting beaches safer.

In “volunteers record,” record is a verb meaning write down information. In “This record,” it is a noun meaning the written information or document.
3	In paragraph 2, what does shelter mean in “The screen is not a shelter from heat” and in “staff may shelter the clutch”? Identify the part of speech in each use.	Shelter is a noun meaning protection or cover in the first use. It is a verb meaning protect or place in a safe location in the second use.

In “they release them,” release is a verb meaning let the hatchlings go. In “The release,” it is a noun meaning the event of letting hatchlings go.
