Why Some Blocks Stay Hot

- ① On a summer afternoon, a city block can be much hotter than a nearby park. Dark roofs and asphalt absorb solar energy, then release heat slowly after sunset. This pattern is called an urban heat island, although no land is surrounded by water. Pavement is often impermeable, meaning rain cannot soak through it into the soil. Instead, water rushes into drains, while the hard surface stores heat. Fewer trees also means less shade and less cooling from evaporation. These connected conditions can make heat waves especially dangerous for people who lack air conditioning.
- ② Cities can mitigate, or reduce, this extra heat by changing surfaces and planting vegetation. A reflective roof is pale or specially coated, so it sends more sunlight back into the atmosphere instead of absorbing it. Trees cool an area in two ways. Their leaves create shade, and they release water vapor through transpiration. As that water changes from liquid to gas, it draws heat from the surrounding air. Because young trees need time to grow, planners may combine tree planting with cool roofs, shaded bus stops, and drinking-water stations.
- ③ These measures are not equally available in every neighborhood. In many cities, historically disinvested areas have fewer parks and more wide roads, warehouses, or parking lots. Researchers use the term inequitable to describe a condition that is not fair or evenly shared. A heat map can reveal temperature differences from one block to the next, but it does not explain every cause by itself. To plan effective improvements, city officials need local observations, such as where people wait for buses, which buildings lack cooling, and whether new trees will receive water and care.

3	What does transpiration mean as it is used in paragraph 2? Which nearby description gives the clue?	Transpiration is the release of water vapor from leaves. The clue says water changes from liquid to gas and draws heat from the surrounding air.
4	What does disinvested most likely mean in paragraph 3? Use the prefix dis- and the neighborhood details to support your answer.	Disinvested means having received too little investment or having resources withdrawn over time. The areas have fewer parks and more roads, warehouses, or parking lots.
