San Francisco Rebuilds

- ① On April 18, 1906, a powerful earthquake shook San Francisco before dawn. Brick walls crumbled, streets split, and gas lines broke. Fires soon spread through neighborhoods where water pipes had also ruptured. In the confusion, many residents carried supplies to open spaces such as parks and plazas. The city's telegraph system was crippled, so reliable news traveled slowly. People often relied on handwritten notices or word of mouth to learn where relatives had gone. The disaster destroyed thousands of buildings, but it also revealed how quickly ordinary systems can fail when several problems strike at once.
- ② Within days, volunteers and soldiers organized makeshift camps in Golden Gate Park and other open areas. Families slept in tents, wooden sheds, or shelters built from salvaged boards. These arrangements were not meant to last, but they offered safety away from damaged buildings and burning districts. Food lines formed near field kitchens, where workers prepared simple meals for large crowds. The camps also became places for sharing information. A person searching for a missing neighbor might scan lists posted near a tent or ask people arriving from another part of the city. Such connections were tenuous, yet they mattered.
- ③ Rebuilding required years, not weeks. City leaders adopted new building rules, while residents reopened shops and repaired homes. Many businesses operated from provisional locations, including tents or small temporary structures, until permanent spaces were ready. The city's recovery was uneven: some people had insurance or savings, while others faced severe losses with little help. Still, San Francisco's residents showed resilience by creating new routines amid the damage. The earthquake and fires changed the city's streets and skyline, but they did not erase its communities. Today, photographs, letters, and surviving buildings help historians study how people responded to the catastrophe.
