1 READ AND MARK

Following a Question

- ① During a unit on neighborhood change, Lena chose to investigate why the old Riverton Theater had become a grocery store. Instead of waiting for the teacher to assign a source, she wrote a question in her notebook: What did residents lose, and what did they gain? At the public library, she skimmed a 2018 newspaper article, then paused when its map of the block confused her. She compared the map with a current city map and labeled the streets herself. That choice helped her see that the theater had stood near a bus stop, not in the center of the shopping district.
- ② Her first draft claimed that the grocery store had simply erased a community landmark. Before keeping that claim, Lena read meeting minutes from the planning board and an interview with the store manager. The minutes showed that the theater had closed after years of declining ticket sales. The interview explained that the store added fresh-food delivery for older residents. Lena revised her claim to say that the change removed a gathering place while also meeting a neighborhood need. She highlighted the sentence that best stated her new claim and placed links to both sources beside it.
- ③ On the next day, Lena asked two classmates to read her article, but she did not ask them to tell her what to write. She asked them to underline any place where the evidence did not support the claim. One reader questioned a sentence about the bus stop. Lena returned to the city maps, found that the route had been removed in 2020, and revised the sentence to include that date. She then made a checklist for her final review: clear claim, accurate evidence, working links, and a title that matched the article. By choosing questions, checking sources, and deciding which changes to make, Lena directed her own process.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

For my history research paragraph, I will investigate how women codebreakers contributed to Allied intelligence during World War II. First, I will begin with a museum article and use its citations to locate a second reliable source, rather than relying on the first website I find. Next, I will make a note card for each source that separates facts from my own explanation. After drafting, I will reread my claim and highlight every sentence that needs evidence. If a source does not support a sentence, I will replace the sentence, find stronger evidence, or narrow my claim before I submit the paragraph.

For the marking job, accept any independently directed choice from each paragraph when it is accurately identified. Accept equivalent evidence-based answers that explain Lena's choices and how those choices shaped her work.
