Rebuilding a Reef

- ① Along Florida's coast, some scientists are rebuilding damaged coral reefs with small underwater nurseries. They attach living coral fragments to frames made of PVC pipe, where the pieces can grow without being buried by sand. After several months, divers transplant the strongest fragments onto bare sections of reef. In this process, transplant does not mean moving a plant into soil. It means carefully moving a living organism from one place to another so it can continue growing. The new corals provide shelter for fish and other animals.
- ② Restoration teams also study which corals are most resilient. A resilient coral can recover after stress, such as unusually warm water or a powerful storm. Researchers measure survival, growth, and bleaching, a condition in which corals lose the algae that help feed them. These observations are data, or recorded information used to answer questions. By comparing data from many sites, scientists can identify colonies that may be better suited to changing conditions. This evidence does not guarantee that a reef will survive, but it helps teams make informed choices about which corals to grow and where to place them.
- ③ Before divers return to a restored reef, they complete a survey of the area. A survey is a systematic examination, meaning that the team follows the same planned steps each time. Divers record the number and kinds of fish, photograph the corals, and note any damage. Repeated surveys allow scientists to monitor change over time rather than rely on a single visit. If fish populations increase and young corals remain alive, the project may be succeeding. However, scientists must consider other factors, including water quality and storms, before claiming that the restoration alone caused the changes.
