Restoring Harbor Creek

- ① On Saturday, volunteers at Harbor Creek restored a neglected stream bank. The project begins at eight o'clock, but several students arrives before sunrise to carry gloves and shovels. Ms. Patel, the science teacher, explains that native plants hold soil in place, they also create shelter for insects and small fish. At the water's edge, teams sorted litter into bags. The park rangers map showed where earlier floods had cut into the bank. Working beside the creek. By noon, volunteers had cleared three truckloads of trash and planted young switchgrass.
- ② The group worked from a plan created by the city's watershed office. Each crew have a different task: one crew removes invasive vines, another records the plants already growing there. The students' notes include counts of willow stems and dragonflies. Near a culvert, a pair of beavers builds a low dam, the workers pause so the animals can move safely downstream. The tools belong in the supply trailer after use. When the final bags are weighed, the totals from each team is added to the project log. The day's work will guide next month's planting.
- ③ Restoration continues after the workday ends. City staff checks the site after heavy rain, and the volunteers return each month to remove new weeds. The creeks water looks clearer in some places, but scientists need several years of data to measure larger changes. The creek support frogs, herons, and many kinds of insects. Residents can help by keeping leaves, paint, and oil out of storm drains. A clean bank does not solve every problem, it gives the stream a stronger chance to recover. The project shows how careful work and regular observation can protect a shared place.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Join the Westview Ecology Club on Friday at Pine Street Park, where we will test the water near the rain garden. After students receive their equipment, they will measure temperature, cloudiness, and pH, and the club's adviser will record the results. Each team will label its sample bottle carefully and return unused tools to the storage cart. The data will help the city compare this season's water quality with last spring's results.
