A Debate on Maple Avenue

- ① At a public meeting in Riverton, the transportation department released a two-page brief about a proposed protected bike lane on Maple Avenue. The brief lists 42 reported crashes involving cyclists or pedestrians during the past five years and includes a map of the street's schools, library, and bus stops. It says the lane would replace one travel lane for six blocks, leaving two lanes for cars. A chart projects that the change could add about one minute to a typical car trip at afternoon rush hour. The brief also notes that federal safety grants could cover much of construction.
- ② During the same meeting, Malik Chen, who owns a bakery on Maple Avenue, submitted a letter to the council. He wrote that customers often carry cake boxes or pick up large orders, so they need places to stop near the storefront. Chen described seeing a delivery driver circle the block twice on a rainy Saturday before leaving without unloading flour. He asked the council to preserve curbside loading spaces and to test the lane for three months before making it permanent. His letter included signatures from 18 nearby business owners and a photograph of a crowded curb at noon.
- ③ A week later, ninth grader Sofia Alvarez published an opinion column in the school newspaper. She recalled biking home beside Maple Avenue when a van's open door forced her toward moving traffic. "I was shaking when I reached the next block," she wrote. Alvarez argued that students should be able to travel without choosing between riding on the sidewalk and riding beside cars. Rather than citing crash totals, she described the noise of buses, doors opening, and drivers turning across the bike route. She invited readers to attend the council vote and bring a helmet to place on the meeting-room steps.

1	What concern about Maple Avenue connects the transportation brief and Alvarez's column? Give one detail from each source that develops that concern.	Both sources focus on safety for people traveling on Maple Avenue. The brief lists 42 crashes involving cyclists or pedestrians, while Alvarez describes being forced toward moving traffic by an open van door.
2	Compare how the transportation brief and Alvarez establish their perspectives. What type of evidence does each use, and how could each type affect readers?	The brief uses statistics, a map, and a traffic-time projection, which can make its perspective seem measured and practical. Alvarez uses a personal experience and sensory details, which can make the danger feel immediate and personal.
3	What does Chen want the council to do? Explain how his delivery anecdote and included materials develop his perspective.	Chen wants the council to preserve loading spaces and test the lane for three months. His story about the driver leaving without unloading flour, along with business-owner signatures and a curb photograph, emphasizes possible problems for businesses and deliveries.
4	Chen and Alvarez both use an individual experience. How do their experiences lead readers to focus on different possible effects of the proposal?	Chen's experience directs attention to customer access and delivery needs for businesses. Alvarez's experience directs attention to the physical risk that cyclists face near traffic.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Riverton should approve a three-month bike-lane test while protecting marked loading spaces. The transportation brief supports action with crash data, a map, and a prediction of only one extra minute for drivers. Alvarez makes the safety concern personal through her account of being forced toward traffic. Chen's delivery story and curb photograph show that the plan must address business access. Using both safety evidence and a trial period responds to the strongest concerns in all three texts.

Accept equivalent explanations of each source's perspective when students support them with accurate passage details. For the open response, accept different recommendations if the response uses at least two sources and explains how their evidence, language, or examples shape readers' views.
