HOW TO RUN THIS PAGE

Use family-provided address information or school records to check each child's response. Read the sheet aloud, and meet with children one at a time or in a small group so they do not say private addresses to classmates. The student shows the skill by naming the street address, city, state, and country where they live.

Students never read directions on this sheet. Read each part's script aloud, then each prompt, giving think time before students mark.

PART 1 • ADDRESS PARTS

SAY "Listen to each pretend address word. Look at the four words in the row, then circle the kind of address part you hear."

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	In a pretend address, I say, "Maple Road." Which kind of address part is it? Circle the word.	Street
b	In a pretend address, I say, "Denver." Which kind of address part is it? Circle the word.	City
c	In a pretend address, I say, "Texas." Which kind of address part is it? Circle the word.	State
d	In a pretend address, I say, "Mexico." Which kind of address part is it? Circle the word.	Country

PART 2 • TELL ME

SAY "When it is your turn, whisper your whole address to me: your street address, city, state, and country. After you tell me, write the first letter of your city in the City box and the first letter of your country in the Country box."

- Box 1 (beside City): **The first letter of the student's city.**
- Box 2 (beside Country): **The first letter of the student's country.**

WHAT TO ACCEPT

Circle answers, in order, are Street, City, State, Country. Accept an accurate oral street address, city, state, and country verified with family-provided information or school records, plus the matching first letters in the two boxes.
