A Report About Honeybees

- ① Today I will report on honeybees and the work they do. Honeybees visit flowers to collect nectar and pollen. Nectar is a sweet liquid that bees use to make honey. Pollen sticks to a bee’s fuzzy body. As a bee moves from flower to flower, some pollen can help plants make seeds and fruit too.
- ② First, I will explain where honeybees live. Many honeybees live together in a hive. Inside, worker bees clean the hive, feed young bees, and gather food. One worker may visit many flowers during a trip. I would pause here, before I continue my report, so listeners can picture the busy hive and understand each job clearly.
- ③ Next, I will describe how bees share information. A worker bee can perform a waggle dance inside the hive. The dance tells other workers about a food source. The direction and length of the dance give clues about where to fly. I will speak slowly when I say those details, so my audience can follow them.
