Maya Studies City Trees

- ① Maya wondered why some streets feel cooler than others on hot days. She turned her wonder into a research question: “How do city trees cool nearby places?” She chose this question because she could look for facts, not just opinions. Before she searched, Maya guessed that shade might matter. Her guess gave her an idea to check.
- ② First, Maya read a park-department webpage about street trees. Then she used a library book about plant leaves. Both sources explained that leaves block sunlight. The book added that trees release water vapor, which can help cool the air. Maya wrote each fact in her notebook and copied the source name beside it.
- ③ Maya did not stop after finding one answer. She compared the two sources and noticed that both mentioned shade. She wrote, “Shade is one way trees cool a street.” Next, she made a new question: “Do all kinds of trees make the same amount of shade?” This question could guide her next search and help her learn more about city trees.
