The Seed I Saved

- ① After I read *Mara's Garden*, I wrote this poem. In the story, Mara's seedlings washed away in a hard rain. She planted again with help from her neighbors. Her choice made me think about my own bean plant, which bent during a windy week but grew straight after I tied it to a stick in the soil.
- ② Rain tapped the leaves like tiny drums, and my green stem leaned low. I remembered Mara lifting mud from roots with careful hands, slow, slow. I found a stick beside the fence, then tied my plant with string. By morning, its bright leaves faced the sun, as if they planned to sing again with hope.
- ③ My poem does not retell every part of Mara's story. Instead, I used rain, a bent stem, and the rising sun to show a shared idea: keep working after a problem. The plant is also a symbol of my own effort. I chose gentle, hopeful words because Mara's neighbors and my family both helped someone grow stronger.
