Why Monarchs Need Habitats

- ① Good morning. Today I will explain why monarch butterflies need connected habitats during their long migration. Each fall, many eastern monarchs fly from the United States and Canada to mountain forests in central Mexico. Their trip can stretch thousands of miles. Along the way, the butterflies need nectar from flowers for energy and sheltered places to rest.
- ② First, monarchs leave northern areas when cooler weather arrives and flowers become scarce. Next, they travel south, using the sun and Earth's magnetic field to help guide them. A monarch weighs less than a penny, yet it may glide over fields and cross large bodies of water. These facts show that the journey is difficult, even for such a small insect.
- ③ Finally, monarchs reach Mexico, where millions cluster on oyamel fir trees during winter. In spring, the butterflies begin moving north, and later generations continue the trip. I will pause after each part of the journey so listeners can follow the order. I will use a steady pace and a voice loud enough for classmates at the back of the room.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Bean plants grow from seeds through a series of changes. First, a seed absorbs water, and its coat softens. Next, a root grows downward to take in water and minerals from the soil. Finally, a stem and leaves grow upward, and the leaves use sunlight to make food. I will pause between each step and use a clear voice that reaches listeners in the back.
