Maya Studies Schoolyard Trees

- ① Maya wanted to find out how trees could improve her schoolyard. She began with one broad question: How do trees affect people and living things nearby? Next, she made three smaller questions about shade, rainwater, and wildlife. Breaking a large topic into aspects helped Maya plan research instead of searching for random facts online first.
- ② For shade, Maya used the school grounds map and measured the shadow from an oak tree at noon. For rainwater, she read a city water department article explaining that tree roots help soil take in water. For wildlife, she searched a nature center website and learned that oaks provide food and shelter for many insects and birds.
- ③ Maya compared notes from all three sources. The map and measurement gave local evidence about one tree, while the article and website gave information from experts. She wrote an answer to her broad question: trees can cool a place with shade, help rainwater soak into soil, and support wildlife. She also noted a new question about which tree species would fit her schoolyard best.

3	Which source did Maya use for the rainwater question, and what information did it provide?	She used a city water department article. It explained that tree roots help soil take in water.
4	Why did Maya compare notes from all three sources before writing her answer?	Comparing notes let her use local evidence from the map and measurement along with expert information from the article and website.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Broad question: How can our school garden attract more butterflies? Smaller questions: Which flowers provide nectar in spring? Which sunny places have room for new plants? I would use a butterfly guide from a nature center for the first question. I would observe and measure sunny garden spaces for the second question.
