Views of an Earthquake

- ① To study the 1906 San Francisco earthquake, a student might begin with a printed newspaper page from April 1906. Its large headlines and short reports show what residents learned soon after the shaking stopped. Advertisements and missing-person notices also reveal daily worries. However, reporters had limited information, and some early claims were wrong. Reading the page helps the student notice the uncertainty people faced, but it cannot show where damage occurred across the whole city.
- ② A digital map created from later records can add a different view. A reader can select layers that mark fires, broken water pipes, and areas where buildings collapsed. Clicking a neighborhood can reveal several sources connected to that place. Because the map gathers evidence from across the city, patterns are easier to spot than on one newspaper page. Yet the map's symbols do not communicate the fear or confusion in a resident's own words.
- ③ An online audio interview with an earthquake survivor offers another format. The speaker's pauses, tone, and word choices can make one personal memory vivid. Listeners must remember that a memory recorded years later may leave out details or blend events together. Comparing all three formats gives a fuller understanding. The newspaper captures immediate reactions, the map displays citywide patterns, and the interview shares an individual's experience. Each source answers a different question about the same disaster.
