GENERAL DICTIONARY

Use a general dictionary for common words, standard pronunciations, parts of speech, and everyday meanings. It helps when a word has more than one common meaning.

A dictionary can show that *cautious* is an adjective and give its pronunciation.

SPECIALIZED GLOSSARY

Use a specialized glossary for precise words from a subject, such as science, math, or literature. It explains how experts use the word in that field.

A geology glossary can define *tectonic plate* as a large moving piece of Earth's outer layer.
