A Later Start Time

- ① When I speak to the school board, I will make one clear claim: our middle school should begin at 8:30 a.m. or later. This change would give students a better chance to get the sleep their growing bodies need. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends start times of 8:30 a.m. or later for middle and high schools. I will say my claim slowly, face the audience, and pause before my first supporting reason. This helps listeners hear the main point.
- ② My strongest evidence is practical. Teens need 8 to 10 hours of sleep each night, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Yet an early bus schedule can make that goal difficult for students who must wake before sunrise. I will explain this fact clearly, then give a brief example: a student who wakes at 6:00 a.m. needs to fall asleep by 10:00 p.m. to get eight hours. I will use a steady, audible voice so the numbers are easy to follow.
- ③ Finally, I will connect the evidence to our school. More sleep can help students arrive ready to learn, rather than exhausted during first period. I will not list every possible benefit, because my audience needs a focused message. Instead, I will repeat my claim and ask the board to consider a later start time. During the final sentence, I will look up from my notes, speak each word distinctly, and keep my volume high enough for people in the back row.

Answers may include facing the audience, pausing before a reason, using a steady audible voice, looking up from notes, speaking distinctly, or using enough volume for the back row. Each helps listeners see, hear, or follow the message.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Our school should keep the library open during lunch. [Look at the audience before beginning.] Students who need a quiet place could finish homework instead of trying to work in a noisy cafeteria. For example, a student with a project due the next day could use library books and computers. A lunch-hour library would also give students a safe place to read or study. Keeping the library open is a useful change that would help students use lunch time well. [Speak the final sentence clearly and loudly enough for the back row.]

Accept equivalent wording for the claim and evidence. For the open response, look for a focused school-related claim, two relevant supporting details or examples, a repeated closing claim, and both required delivery notes.
